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Year 5/6 Newsletter

During the past half term, Year 5 and 6 have been learning about the history of Ascension Island, from the 1500s to present day. We began by chronologically ordering an Ascension Island timeline to discover what happened and when.

As part of our topic on Ascension Island, we learnt more about William Bate, who played a great part in Ascension Island's history. He was responsible for giving Georgetown its name, along with developing the water catchment tank and pipeline from Dampier's Drip. We went to see the remains of the water catchment tank at Dampiers and also discovered that many workers lived in the caves between Two Boats and Dampier's Drip.



We also learnt about the role the Telegraph played on the island and how Morse Code was used to relay messages from Africa and beyond back to the U.K. We began by turning text into Morse Code. We then practised tapping out our messages using a simple circuit with a



buzzer attached. This was lots of fun! We then learnt about the Eastern Telegraph Company and their time on the Island. Can you see the current AIG building? It was used as their main offices on the island?

Savannah – "We explored many cave houses. The bit I found most interesting was the fact that they had 2 separate rooms and lots of storage space inside."

Kiara – "I learnt that a woman lived in the caves near Dampiers. Her nickname was Cinderella."





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We have also been learning about the natural history of the island. We would like to say a huge thank you to the conservation team, who hosted us on Wednesday this week. We had lots of fun learning about: how the island was formed; how long it took for living things to inhabit the island; how native species came to be on the island, E.g. the bird Ascension **Frigate** and how introduced living things came to be on the island, e.g. rats, cats, sheep, goats, banana plants, guava plants etc.

Rosie – "My favorite part about our trip to visit conservation was when we tried to blow bottle tops (imitating seeds) across the ocean to Ascension. We then watched a nature video about Ascension."
