Marine Science Visit

On Tuesday 26th March, IGCSE Marine Science students (Wyatt, Rhiann & Jordan) accompanied by Miss Henry visited the Conservation Centre in Georgetown in conjunction with the 'Marine Organisms' topic.


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
Students were met by Mel and Cuen. Mel showed the students the Lab where eDNA sequencing takes place to find out about the different marine species in the Ascension waters.

Back in the Conservation Centre, Cuen showed the students a water sample that contained plankton, which they were able to view under a powerful microscope. This was the highlight of the visit. Cuen also dissected a grouper and students were able to identify the internal organs, the fins and other external features. The Marine Science students made annotated drawings of the grouper fish.

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


Coding Sessions at Two Boats School
