#### 'Make your Mark' Vote:

Following the success of the inaugural 'Make Your Mark' vote last year, with over 2900 young people voting from across the British Overseas Territories, Two Boats School were once again keen to take the opportunity to partake. It is a consultation for all 11 to 18 year olds within the British Overseas Territories to decide the topic which will be raised by the Overseas Territories Youth Representatives during the UK Youth Parliament sitting. The UK Youth Parliament is the only organisation other than MPs permitted to sit and debate in the House of Commons Chamber in London.

Since 2022, Mr Speaker has invited one young person from each British Overseas Territory to London to take part in a special debate on the floor of the House of Commons. In 2024, for the first time, young people from across the British Overseas Territories took part in 'Make Your Mark', helping to decide the topic of their debate, which was 'education and learning'. In 2025, young people are once again voting on their number one issue, which will become the debate topic for the Overseas Territories sitting in the House of Commons on 6th November 2025.

Year 5 and 6 have been studying the Ancient Greeks this term. They are known as brilliant thinkers, fierce warriors, great poets, wonderful artists, amazing athletes, worshipped powerful gods and told stories about extraordinary monsters...and the ancient Greeks were quite impressive too!



Our English text is based on Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief. 

In our Science topic of space, we have discovered that the ancient Greeks believed in a geocentric model, where the earth is at the centre of the universe. This idea was the dominant theory until about 500 years ago...although the first person to propose the current heliocentric (sun at the centre) model was also an ancient Greek.



We have really enjoyed finding out more about the life and times of the Ancient Greeks as part of our Humanities lessons. We have looked at the extent of the empire, the leadership qualities, what everyday life was like and compared the ancient and modern Olympics. This has been supported in PE, as we have been preparing for Sports Day and developing skills in many athletic events that were also on show in the ancient Olympic Games.





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In Art, we have been exploring the world of Greek art, researching artists that are linked with the time period as well as creating some of their pieces. Finally, we will create our own piece in a similar style using clay.





We have discovered some amazing facts along our learning journey:

#### Did you know:

- Ancient Greece wasn't an independent country but was in fact a group of city-states.
- Athenians' main form of transport was by boat, and fishing was big business.
- The life of a farmer was hard because the soil was dusty and the climate hot and dry
- Olive oil was used for cooking, lighting and washing.
- Alexander the Great was a great leader who expanded the ancient Greek empire but he

generally tried to be civil to those areas he conquered.

- Zeus throws lightning bolts when he is angry.
- Apollo caused the sun to rise and set by pulling it across the sky behind his chariot.
- Tragedies and comedies were performed in theatres.
- A 12m high gold and ivory statue of the goddess Athena was inside the Parthenon.
- Ancient Greek Olympians used to compete without any clothes on, apart from chariot racers.
- Only men were allowed to compete or spectate in the Olympics.
- An invention like the vending machine was created by Ancient Greeks.
- The ancient Greeks developed the first alarm clock.
- 12 major gods were believed to reside on Mount Olympus
- The Olympic Games originated in Ancient Greece in 776 BC
- Citizens used stones as toilet paper.
- For some time, the Greeks avoided eating beans, believing they contained the souls of the dead.
